Welcome to 2014!

For 49 years, the Economic Opportunity Program Inc. of Chemung and Schuyler Counties (EOP) has sought to live up to its vision and mission to co-create a place ... where all people of our community live with dignity and have the opportunity and ability to live economically productive and satisfying lives.

When people read that statement, often the next logical question is, "So, what is it that you really DO?" Our answer: We Do People!!! Simply put, we train, educate, guide, coach, safeguard, feed, and care for people. Our programs in Childcare, Family Development, Youth Care, and Community and Economic Development help rebuild individuals and communities.

We Do People... and these are only some of our results:

- 351 3-4 year olds in Head Start; serving more than 190,000 meals
- <u>94</u> 5-12 year olds in the *Center Of Excellence* (COE) / New Day Afterschool Program
- 500 + children and youth in the activities hosted at the Ernie Davis Community Center
- 1,050 meals prepared by the CFJP Bistro team and served by volunteers and staff at the MLK, Jr. Day Free Community Dinner ("Together We Dine")
- 118 homes weatherized in Chemung and Schuyler Counties...

We Do People at *EOP* and with the help of 174 dedicated staff, 350 volunteers, and 14 committed board members and you... *We Do People...* well!!

EOP's Vision and Mission

EOP envisions a future where all people of our community live with dignity and have the opportunity and ability to live economically productive and satisfying lives.

To achieve this vision, EOP provides services that create positive change in individuals, families and our community, and encourages and facilitates participation by all people who can help make our vision a reality.

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The results say it all:

- The school year documented growth for all children. 3-4 year old children showed a 55% increase in Language and Literacy and a 45% increase in Cognition and General Knowledge.
- 4-5 year olds demonstrated a 95% readiness to transition into a Kindergarten classroom.
- Participation in the CLASS quality assessment with the Chemung County SRP indicated that the Head Start program is above national thresholds in all Domains with a significant increase of .5 in the Instructional Support area.
- 3 Head Start sites have been accepted into full participation with QualitystarsNY. Sites work with a consultant to develop Quality Improvement and receive Quality Scholar dollars for support and staff development. Quality Stars is a supporter for the annual Enrichment Opportunities for Professionals Early Childhood Conference.
- 68 children served were diagnosed with a disability.
- 27 children and families were served by the Head Start Mental Health Specialist.
- 42 children were served in the Social Skills program.



Chemung County School Readiness Project

EOP has been an active partner in the Chemung County School Readiness Project (SRP) since its inception and employs the SRP Parent Education Coordinator. A critical aspect to SRP is the data collection and research evaluating the readiness levels of children entering kindergarten in Chemung County. The June 2012 publication of the SRP Final Evaluation Report indicated an overall increase in readiness from 47.5% in 2007 to 68.6% in 2011. The 2013 publication showed that school readiness across the county remained stable. Significant improvements from 2011 have been sustained.

The Child Development Head Start
Program participated in its triennial on-site
Federal review April 30-May 4, 2012.
Two areas of non-compliance were
identified and corrected including
1) medication handling, storage, and
labeling, and 2) governing body and
Policy Council Conflict of Interest.

Community Development

Community Food For Jobs Program (CFJP)

The CFJP offers a 10-week culinary arts training program to facilitate the creation of additional employment opportunities in our community by providing job training, education, and placement.

2012-2013 Highlights:

• III individuals have completed the program from inception to

June 2013.

- 92% have gained employment.
- 98% are ServSafe Certified.
- Provided ServSafe training to other food service organizations.

CFIP Bistro

The CFJP Bistro provides on-thejob training to CFJP participants and provides a micro-economic project. The CFJP Bistro also provides catering services and is open to the public for breakfast and lunch Tuesdays-Thursdays 10am-5pm, and Fridays 11am-8pm for breakfast, lunch, and Fish Fry or Chicken Wings. The CFJP Bistro is located in the Ernie Davis Community Center.

2012-2013 Highlights:

- Catered community events, serving over 3,000 people.

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Family Development

Family Support Services

Advocacy and support services for individuals with disabilities, including cost reimbursement and recreational outlets.

2012-2013 Highlights:

- 112 families and individuals with disabilities served.
- Autism Playgroups I and II served 23 children.
- The recreation program served 36 individuals.
- The Family Reimbursement Program served 46 individuals.
- The First Annual Autism Walk was held at Eldridge Park with 177 walkers and raising \$6,102 for the Autism Playgroups.

First Choices

A referral-based employment program designed to assist participants who meet certain criteria in obtaining employment.

2012-2013 Highlights:

- · 1,463 adults served.
- 1,966 diverted from Public Assistance.
- 78 referred to employment home.
- 151 gained employment.

<u>Literacy Volunteers of</u> <u>Chemung and Schuyler</u> Counties

This volunteer-based affiliate of Literacy New York and ProLiteracy helps adults improve basic literacy skills, including English skills for speakers of other languages. Volunteer tutors work one-on-one helping adults to accomplish individualized literacy and life goals.

2012-2013 Highlights:

- 70 learners served.
- 105 volunteers worked with the literacy program to help learners achieve their literacy goals.
- Events included: An international

dinner representing 18 countries; a Family Game Night; and "Let's Talk English" weekly gathering to strengthen written and oral communication skills.

 LVCSC moved from the Steele Memorial Library to the EOP Main Office with a new Director and a new Coordinator. A Coordinator for Schuyler County was also hired.

Energy Services Bureau

Weatherizes income-eligible homes in Chemung & Schuyler Counties. Services include attic/sidewall insulation, air sealing and draft reduction measures, heating system efficiency tests/service and replacement. Electric usage reduction includes refrigerator replacement and installation of compact fluorescent light bulbs. Health & safety measures include carbon monoxide testing, gas leak





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detection, and installation of smoke/carbon monoxide detectors. 2012-2013 Highlights:

- 118 homes weatherized in Chemung & Schuyler Counties.
- 60 high efficiency heating systems installed.
- 55 air conditioners installed through the cooling assistance program.
- 24 energy-efficient refrigerators installed.
- Numerous health and safety issues identified and corrected.

Youth Care

Center of Excellence (formerly New Day)

A licensed School-Aged Child Care program operating in three area schools where children ages 5-12 receive homework assistance, academic enhancement opportunities, prevention education, cultural enrichment, recreation, and a snack.

2012-2013 Highlights:

- 94 students were served.
- Bimonthly hands-on Science and Discovery Program.
- Weekly Drug and Alcohol prevention classes.
- · Biweekly 2nd Step Curriculum-

- Prevention Education.
- Weekly Boys and Girls Circlefostering self-esteem.
- Summer Program for children ages 4-12 ran at two sites serving 16 children.

Ernie Davis Community Center

An afterschool program that allows children to engage in culturally enriching and physical/social/educational experiential learning activities.

2012-2013 Highlights:

· 300-500 students were served.

- Christmas Magic 500+ children and their families.
- 12 youth are involved in daily tutoring services.
- Kids Café served 1800 meals.
- · Youth Basketball serving 175.
- USA Boxing (currently in need of a coach, but 24 youth and 4 adults focusing on physical fitness /skill building with the help of volunteers).
- Other activities: 2nd Annual Rule The Runway fashion show; Fashion Club; Dance Team; Jr. Culinary Arts Cooking Program; Book Fest; and Digital Audio Workstation "DAW" group,



Where The Money Comes From

An independent financial audit was completed by Insero CPAs, Inc. dated December 17, 2013. It was an unqualified report that fairly presents the financial position of EOP as of June 30, 2013 and June 30, 2012. There were no findings.



How The Money Is Allocated
